
February Field Trip

SHARE THE CARE

At our well attended December Holiday Brunch, the focus of our giving was CASA, Atlanta Court Appointed Special Advocates. Tucked into their Stocking was an excess of \$1000. EUWC's association with CASA goes back to 2005.

In January, the **Infusion Center of Children's Healthcare** will be our focus. They provide chemotherapy, immune suppressants, and gamma globulins to children and teens from all over Georgia and the Southeast. Infusions are provided for treatment of cancers and management of organ transplants. The children and youth need activities to keep them occupied while receiving their treatments.

Typically we make a monetary gift to our spotlighted agency of the month. Let's try a different approach in January and instead bring boxes of colored pencils to contribute for the kids. Remember how excited you were to get a brand-new box of crayons? If you have been donating \$25, consider this. A box of 50 colored pencils sells for \$8 at Target, and three of those almost equals the check.

If you prefer to write a check, they may be written to *CHOA Infusion Center* and include *Account # GFT – 1000930* which ensures the donation goes to the infusion center and not a general fund.


Friday Morning Book Club



Remembering Felicia Altman Gilbert, 4/22/1917 – 12/23/2022

Fe was born in Berlin, Germany in 1917. Her parents were Alice Hall Altman, actress, and George Altman, Director of the State Theater in Hanover. Both her parents were US citizens, from long-time expatriate families who had emigrated from the US to Germany, one to open a branch of a family bank and the other as an inventor for Krupps. Although her father was Jewish, her mother was Lutheran.

In the early thirties, Felicia was sent to boarding school in Switzerland for protection from growing antisemitism in Germany, while her older brother Ralph, a medical student, remained in Berlin with and her parents. When Hitler rose to power in 1933 the family fled from Germany to Nice in winters and Switzerland in summers. In 1939 they moved to the U.S., enabled by their hereditary citizenship, while many others of their exiled community traversed the Pyrenees to escape the Nazis.

The family settled in San Francisco, while Felicia went to New York and became a student at the Art Student's League. Felicia was a wonderful painter and studied with the best of the era.

Fe's older brother Ralph and his wife Pat became well known for their expertise in ethnic art. They collected ethnic art from around the world and owned a gallery on La Cienega Blvd. in Los Angeles that was a destination for art enthusiasts and the glitterati of Los Angeles. Ralph Altman was appointed the founding Director of the Fowler Museum at UCLA.

While visiting her parents from New York, Felicia met and fell in love with Irving (Gil) Gilbert, who was boarding with her parents as a transportation official during the war. They had been singing his praises and although she initially resisted her parent's encouragement, his charm ultimately won her over.

Their first son, Eric (Ric) was born in 1945, followed by Ralph in 1947. When Ralph was only a few months old, both Felicia and Ralph contracted polio. Felicia spent 6 months in a polio ward and Ralph stayed home with a private nurse. Ric was sent to his paternal grandparents to protect him from contracting it as well.

After returning home, Felicia became pregnant with Bruce, who was born late in 1949. Her doctor recommended that she terminate the pregnancy for her health, but she was determined to have her child.

The children were born and raised in Los Angeles, in the Los Feliz district and in Laurel Canyon. Gil became an executive at Airstream Trailers and Felicia taught art.

In the 70's, after the children were on their own, Fe and Gil moved to Olive Mill Road in Montecito, CA where they resided until Gil's death in 1998. The large house and garden, themselves works of art, were filled with art. Felicia orchestrated the landscaping and Gil built two Japanese style tea houses. It was a warm and welcoming home, frequented by their reading group, which included a Nobel Laureate, musicians, photographers, and writers. It was also the gathering place of the extended family's Christmases that Fe loved so much.

After Gil's death, Felicia came to live in Atlanta with her son Ralph and his family. In 2002 Fe joined the Emory University Woman's Club at urging of her daughter-in-law and Ralph's wife, Mary Odem, professor of History at Emory.

Felicia not only painted for most of her life, but she also wrote. She had several short stories published, but in 2005 she published the first of two memoirs, *Of Many Houses, A Young Girl's Journey from the Third Reich to the New World*.

In 2014 Emory University Woman's Club named her as the Achievement Award winner for Literature and Arts. The last several years of Felicia's life were difficult, as both her hearing and eyesight diminished. She would say that it is wonderful to live a long life, but not *too* long. She maintained her sharp wit and sense of humor until the end.
