"How to Shape Institutional Efforts with an Indigenous Lens: The Early Stories of Emory's Center for Native American & Indigenous Studies"

We hope you can join us at our next membership meeting on January 28th when our guest speaker will be Beth Michel. Beth is Senior Associate Director for the Center for Native American and Indigenous Studies at Emory University (NAISI), an ad hoc committee focused on creating awareness of Native American history and contemporary issues. Ms. Michel is a proud citizen of the Tohono O'odham Nation as well as Hopi and Navajo. The collective efforts aim to increase visibility of the Indigenous campus community. A former consultant and advisor for the CDC, she collaborated with more than 30 Tribal health programs and Native-serving organizations to support evaluation design and implementation provided by public health federal funds. Ms. Michel has served in various civic leadership roles and currently serves as the Vice-Chair of her Tribal Nation's Institutional Review Board. She received a Master of Public Health degree from Rollins School of Public Health and a Bachelor of Science from the University of Arizona.
