Pre-Covid I did a lot of volunteer work, rocking babies at Grady, working at church, and recording books for the print-impaired at the Georgia Radio Reading Service. Currently I'm only doing the book recording. I'm in 3 book groups (down from 5), do needlepoint and cross-stitch with moderate success, and spend time at our condo in Fernandina Beach. I'm glad to join the club, and look forward to getting to know and working with all of you.

Martha Catherwood

I was born and raised in Oakland, California. After graduating from high school I headed off to Stanford, fulfilling my father's fondest wish (and, due to his skill at subtle persuasion, my own). My mother told me years later that he had wanted me to go to Stanford "because that's where the smart boys are." I majored in math, and soon discovered a love for computers. Stanford didn't have a computer science major then, but I took every programming course available; I think there were five of them. As graduation approached, many of my friends headed for graduate school, but I was sick of school and so needed to find a job. I sent my resume, such as it was, to an unknown company that was seeking someone with a BS, MS or PhD in math, computer science, or physics. I soon got a call asking me to come in for an interview (my first). After a few preliminaries, my interviewer said, "Do you mind if I ask you a few questions?" I was expecting something like, "What is your greatest strength/weakness?" Instead he took out a piece of paper, wrote a number on it, and said, "What is this number in binary?" Panic! We had touched on that in class, but it had been several months. For an eternity I dug into my memory banks, and finally came up with the answer. Two increasingly difficult questions followed. Two more eternities. Finally it was over. I walked out thinking, "Well, that was a learning experience.

Next time read the job description and review relevant class notes." Much to my surprise, I got a call a week or so later offering me the job. My boss told me later I was the only person he had interviewed who got his questions right. I guess I wasn't the only one who didn't read the job description! After graduation I joined the seven founders and seven other employees, mostly engineers, as employee #15 at Four-Phase Systems. The goal—to produce the first-ever all semiconductor computer. The goal was accomplished a little over a year later when our little (24K of memory) computer just beat out the IBM 370 to market. But I was now preparing to marry one of those smart Stanford boys and move to Los Angeles, where he was starting medical school at UCLA. Fortune smiled on me when my boss announced that the company was opening a marketing office in LA and I could continue in my existing job there. That didn't work out as well as expected as my boss's antipathy for salesmen was matched only by their fervent desire to have me customize software to meet their customers' very specific needs. I had to pick a side. I made a risky bet on the salesmen. My good luck held when a systems engineering job opened up at the branch and I beat out the very flaky competitor whom the branch manager clearly preferred. I could never confirm it, but I believe one of my friends at the home office interceded on my behalf. I loved that company and that job. I loved the constant challenge, the wonderful people with very different skill sets and backgrounds that I worked with, and the "do whatever it takes" attitude of a start-up company; as a twenty-something with minimal responsibilities, I didn't mind the 80 hour work weeks and the all-nighters. The company grew to be listed on the New York Stock Exchange, but the challenges became less as my competency grew, and soon my husband had finished his medical training and was ready to move on to a fellowship in San Diego. I was ready to do something different too. I became a mom and a "professional volunteer" in the UCSD women's club, the PTA, EUWC, Egleston, animal rescue, as a poll worker, and the latest: carting wood chips from pile to trails, pulling ivy, and planting things that sometimes even grow, at three neighborhood parks. And Four-Phase Systems? It was swallowed up by Motorola a few years after I left. I was glad I wasn't there.
