#### 25 Resilient Women in the Amani Sewing Academy Class of 2023

In honor of International Day of Peace, Amani Women Center (AWC) held their Graduation and Recognition Ceremony on September 30 at the Memorial Drive Presbyterian Church in Stone Mountain. This ceremony celebrated the graduation from the Amani Sewing Academy of 25 refugee women from ten different countries, including Afghanistan, Burma, Congo, Eritrea, Ethiopia, Liberia, Burundi, Nepal, Pakistan, and Rwanda. For those of us who remember the first graduating class of two, seeing 25 graduates was phenomenal and represents the growth of AWC, its programs, and its impact on the community it serves. Enrollees for the coming year total 58.

AWC serves refugee women from at least 20 countries. The Amani Sewing Academy provides opportunities to refugee women living in Clarkston and surrounding cities in DeKalb County. At the most basic level participants learn skills that lead to an income. Beyond that they develop a sense of empowerment, accomplishment, and self-sufficiency.

We have proudly watched this organization grow and flourish into a first-class training program and retail sales business under the guidance of Doris Mukangu. It was not so very long ago that Doris was the recipient of the Rollins EUWC Scholarship while a student at Emory University. We have seen her work with DeKalb County, the city of Clarkston, and a host of countries abroad to make the transition to living in the U.S. easier for many families. Our organization has hosted bazaars for and encouraged purchases from Amani fabrics, jewelry, and decorations. We thank Dee for being at the graduation to accept this recognition.
